



Brother-Sister Driving Team SET FOR SPRING CARRIAGE RIDES

Once again "Good News Gil" and "Ginger" will be clip-clopping through colonial Stony Brook Hamlet as carriage rides get underway on Sundays, from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. during April and May, (Except May 1). Hitched to their classic, 8-seat wagonette, the brother-sister driving team trots past the elegant federalist style post office where the mechanical eagle flaps his wings on the hour; past the historic Three Village Inn; over to the harbor and back to the Village Center.

"Good News Gil" and "Ginger" lead the good life now, but they were once simple field horses. Sold for meat in North Dakota, they traveled through the auction circuit to Pennsylvania. When Authentic Carriages finally acquired the horses, it was a major career step for the twosome. Now the fully trained driving quarterhorses are ready to spring into action for the season.

Grist Mill Education Program


